PARTISAN PRIMARY ELECTION LOCATION, HOURS OF POLLING PLACE AND BOARD OF CANVASSERS

The polls will be open for the Partisan Primary Election to be held on August 11, 2020, from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM. Voting will take place at the Chenequa Village Hall located at 31275 W County Road K in the Village of Chenequa. Polling place is accessible to elderly and disabled voters.

At the close of Election Day, pursuant to the provisions of Wis. Stat. §19.84, the Election Inspectors will convene as a joint meeting of the Municipal Board of Canvassers for the purpose of conducting the municipal canvass pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§7.51 and 7.53(1). This meeting will be open to the public pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§19.81-89.

If needed, the Municipal Board of Canvassers will also hold a meeting at 4:00 p.m. in the Village Office to process and count late-arriving provisional ballots (if any) that arrived in our office by mail on Friday, August 14, 2020.

Each Solicitor shall possess and prominently display a valid Solicitor's Permit. This permit can be requested at the Village Hall during normal business hours. The Village does keep track of any and all valid Chenequa Solicitor Permits.

Does Your Driveway Meet Emergency Standards?

Next time you drive down your driveway, please take a moment to look at the surrounding vegetation. Spring and summer rains have resulted in excessive growth and has caused many driveways to begin to “tunnel in”. In the event of an emergency, all driveways need to be large enough to support an emergency vehicle. This means that brush and tree limbs must be cleared to allow for a **12'W x 12'H opening**. Failure to do this can result in slower response times and damaged emergency equipment.

Additionally, please be mindful of the condition of your pavement. Driveways that are cracked or developing pot holes are extremely taxing on the village plow equipment and should be considered for repair or replacement.
