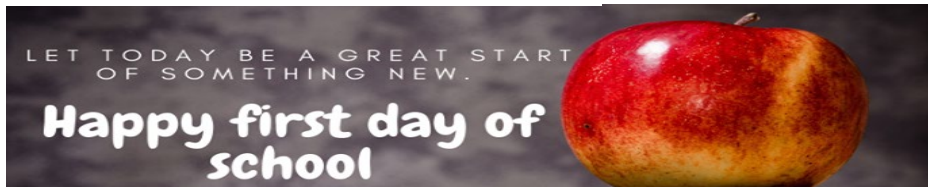
Getting Ready for Fall

Soliciting in the Village

In accordance with Section 2.2 of the Village of Chenequa Ordinances, any individual who, personally or for any other person, organization, society, association, or corporation, goes to private residences and distributes literature or solicits money, services, financial assistance or orders for the sale of goods or services is considered a solicitor. Solicitors are required to have a permit to engage in or sponsor solicitation within the Village of Chenequa. Each Solicitor shall possess and prominently display a valid Solicitor's Permit. This permit is requested at the Village Hall during normal business hours. The Village does keep track of any and all valid Chenequa Solicitor Permits.

1. Have trash and recycle containers out by 7am.
2. DO NOT park cars in front of trash and recycling.
3. Cardboard boxes must be empty and flattened.
4. DO NOT put yard waste in the garbage.
5. Contact Johns Disposal:
 - (a) for special pickups
 - (b) for missed pickup
 - (c) for extended vacations or seasonal service. (4 weeks or more.)

Does Your Driveway Meet Emergency Standards?

Next time you drive down your driveway, please take a moment to look at the surrounding vegetation. Spring and summer rains have resulted in excessive growth and has caused many driveways to begin to "tunnel in". In the event of an emergency, all driveways need to be large enough to support an emergency vehicle. This means that brush and tree limbs must be cleared to allow for a **12'W x 12'H opening**. Failure to do this can result in slower response times and damaged emergency equipment.

Additionally, please be mindful of the condition of your pavement. Driveways that are cracked or developing potholes are extremely taxing on the village plow equipment and should be considered for repair or replacement.
